Identify groups of people such as workers in the developing world and consumers in the developed world.</p> <p>You should aim to write between 750-1250 words. Your answers must not exceed 1250 words</p>
Your starting point	<p>structure your essay in the following way:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Introduction: What is globalisation? Define globalisation. What do we mean by winners and losers? 2. How does globalisation create losers but also winners economically/socially/culturally: some groups to explore are; sweatshop workers in the developing world, workers in the developed world who have lost their jobs as their company has relocated. Governments of emerging country’s such as India and China. 3. How does globalisation create losers but also winners environmentally: some groups to explore are; people in the developing world putting up with polluted rivers and air pollution in Mumbai etc. Groups of people in Tuvalu suffering from the effects of climate change. People in the developed world having an improved environment due to factories relocating. Environmental pressure groups such as GreenPeace taking action. 4. Conclusion: Provide a direct answer to the question, based on the evidence available. Has globalisation created more losers than winners? Use evidence in your conclusion.
How your work will be assessed	<p>Grade A – Your work will include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● A carefully structured argument containing point, evidence and explanation with a judgement being made in the conclusion based upon evidence from the main body. ● Evidence is gathered from a wide range of resources and is selected appropriately to support the argument. ● Your writing should be evaluative throughout using however, although... <p>Grade C – Your work will include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Argument is reasonably constructed, and has some balance considering evidence from both points of view. Conclusion may lack depth. ● Evidence is gathered from numerous sources but may be imprecisely applied ● May be narrative rather than evaluative. <p>Grade E – Your work will include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Argument will be unclear, only one side of the argument considered or none. Any conclusion that is made will be vague and does not accurately address the question. ● Little or no evidence gathered. ● Writing style will be lacking and will come out more like a list of facts.
