

Drama Curriculum Map- Key stage 3

Our ks3 Drama curriculum is designed to develop transferable skills such as communication, empathy, problem solving, collaborating and creating successful working relationships. All Drama tasks develop students' confidence as well as giving all students the opportunity to express ideas and opinions in a creative way.

Intent: Students will develop skills in the key cornerstones of Drama learning: Development/rehearsal skills, performance skills and evaluation skills. They will explore a range of themes/stimuli and theatre styles, building their understanding of creating, rehearsing, performing and evaluating Drama.

Through practical exploration, students will engage with a range of real-life topics and issues which will further develop student understanding of Cultural, social and

global issues.

Our Catholic ethos is embedded within Our Drama curriculum and strives to follow the gospel values of love, justice and concern for others.

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Rotation/ weekly lessons will run for a 10 week period apart from the last rotation which will run for a 9 week period.

Students will have 20 Drama lessons, running for 50 minutes each per rotation
